

DOWN WHERE THE WOLLOMBI Brook runs quiet and strong, where the peaks of the Broken Back Range slice the sky, there's a valley. It's a valley thick with history: the Wanaruah people have lived here for 30,000 years; and it's been known by its current name since 1830, when the town of Broke was founded.

Vineyards have flourished here ever since, thanks to the alluvial soils and sandy loams perfect for white grapes, and a seam of volcanic red clay loved by red varietals. The valley's most recent chapter has seen it evolve into a thriving food and wine destination. "The change I've seen in the seven years I've been here has been extraordinary," says Karin Adcock, who bought Winmark Wines in 2016.

Never heard of Broke? That's the point. This part of the Hunter Valley, just 15 minutes' drive west of Pokolbin, is the trail less travelled – and it's all the better for it. Stop in for a tasting at one of the wineries that stud the valley, their vines spreading up the hillsides and covering the river flats in leafy green rows, and chances are the person filling your glass is the owner – or winemaker – herself. These are almost all family-owned operations producing small-batch, carefully crafted drops.

The most familiar to oenophiles and gastronomes alike, perhaps, is Margan Wines, where Andrew and Lisa Margan have been filling their trophy cabinet with awards for their sustainably produced, locally grown wines since they opened their doors in 1996. A decade later, they opened a restaurant serving up dishes focused on hyperlocal produce, much of it grown on-site.

Margan Restaurant soon won a chef's hat to add to the family's accolades. The next addition was offering tours of the property to diners. "People want to connect to the provenance of their food and wine, and know about the backstory," says Lisa. "Our experiences connect the dots."

They do indeed. Exploring the winery, rich with the heady scent of fermenting grapes, then strolling around the one-hectare kitchen garden and orchard in gathering twilight is the perfect introduction to a five-course tasting menu in the sophisticated restaurant.


As the Margan family business has blossomed, so has Broke. Its "rural charm" is what initially drew Lisa here, and still, she says, "I enjoy the bucolic bliss of this beautiful valley, surrounded by national parks." Now there's a choice of places to stay, eat and drink, too. >

Karin Adcock is a more recent convert to the beauty of Broke, but she's just as passionate. The corporate high-flyer took a left turn into winemaking after selling her stake in Pandora jewellery, which she launched into Australia. "I unexpectedly fell in love with the property," says Danish-born Karin of the vineyard. "It was initially for family and friends, but as I started spending time at Winmark, I had a strong feeling of needing to share this beautiful place with many more beyond my circle."

She did just that, expanding and upgrading the accommodation, which now consists of four guesthouses, which sleep two, eight, 10 and 14 people respectively.

As if sleeping among the vines weren't enough incentive for visitors, Karin added a whole new element to the experience. "I've always had a love of art and the property presented itself as a wonderful place for sculptures," she explains. The resulting sculpture walk winds around the hillside, with dramatic pieces standing out against the sky There's an art gallery, too, cool and white and stocked with Australian artists. On a recent visit, Julianne Ross Allcorn's delicate botanicals in pencil and acrylics graced

one wall: Alison Mitchell's lit-from-within still-lifes spanned a second; and the juicy, tactile impasto of Felicia Aroney's hydrangea paintings literally stood out from a third. And the main event – the wine – has undergone its own transformation. Winmark Wines now specialises in chardonnay, dedicating 11 hectares to it - and the results show the gamble was worth it, with a gold medal in the recent NSW Small Winemakers Wine Show.

All this has made Karin evangelical about Broke. "We have a wonderful community of passionate operators striving to give our guests the best possible experiences," she says. "The Broke Fordwich Wine Trail has been a great platform to bring us all together and we're going from strength to strength."

Lisa Margan agrees: "Visitors love the less commercialised aspect of this historic but 'softly spoken' region. They love the premium food, wine and accommodation, and connecting with nature. I guess, like all special places, that will make Broke a little busier - but we can all enjoy it now, while it's still a little undiscovered." Visit brokefordwich.com.au
